- Fr. Petite chaired the meeting
- introduced a few new faces in the congregation
 - thanked the ladies of the parish who provided brunch

MOTION: (S. Covert/S. Harris) that the minutes of the last Annual Meeting be accepted as printed. CARRIED.

- OLD BUSINESS - there had been discussion at last year's meeting that a microphone might make the proceedings easier to hear
- perhaps this could be done for the next meeting

- FINANCE - K. Wheeler, Treasurer reviewed the financial statement for 1987
- reminded the congregation that some liabilities have yet to be subtracted from revenues
 - the Diocese has forgiven past arrears made up primarily of allotments
 - the St. George's Foundation's debt has been paid by the Province of Nova Scotia
 - a letter from the Bank of Nova Scotia stating the payment in full is needed
 - in view of these two debts removed the parish's financial situation is good
 - a letter to Mr. Schwartz and the Bishop expressing the parish's gratitude was thought to be appropriate
 - K. Wheeler reviewed the finances of the Soup Kitchen
 - donations made to this cause are for that purpose only, they are not Church funds
 - likewise the Soup Kitchen expenses are not drawn on St. George's
 - 10% increase overall seen in the budget
 - our allotment to the Diocese has been increased

MOTION: (K. Wheeler/R. Martin) that the Financial Statement and the 1988 budget be accepted. CARRIED.

TREASURER/ENVELOPE SECRETARY and FINANCIAL REPORT

I am pleased to report that we ended the year with a \$51.00 surplus. We sincerely thank all those parishioners who were responsible for this and one long time member in particular.

All 1988 invoices have been paid in full and our commitments to the Diocese and Mortgage are also up to date. However, our 1988 Budget was not met and therefore the Finance Committee and Parish Council had to look to ways to reduce our expenditures for 1989. The position of Sexton was reviewed and by unanimous decision it was decided to eliminate the Sexton's position, rent the property and contract the janitorial services out which would be an overall savings of approximately \$6,000. per year.

The Rectory has been occupied by Daisy McDonald and her family since March 1985 and we are very pleased to have such good tenants. We also continue to have regular tenants in the Upper White Camel space, Cdn. Parents for French and we provide space to an Alanon Group each Sunday morning at a minimal cost.

Since September the lower White Camel area has been occupied by the Waldorf Education of N.S. Day Care and we are very grateful to Anna Keefe for her hard work in preparing the premises for opening day at no cost to the parish. It is so nice to drive by and see children playing on the front lawn.

We continue to provide space for our Beavers, Cubs, Scouts and Brownies. We also provide space for band practices, Symphony N.S., N.S. Folk Dancers and Lietash Dog School. For a short time the Education Technology of N.S. are making St. George's their home - they provide art tapes. The church was also rented for concerts this year: Musique Royale and God's Trombones. As well we still rent the Hall for Anniversary parties and Christmas parties. All of the above have brought in a considerable amount of income to help reduce our building expenses.

You will notice in the Property Report that the C.E.I.C. approved a program. We were provided with two \$5,980.00 (\$4,480. in salaries and \$1,500 applied again for this during July to Dec for the Dutch Church.

It was very disappointing for me when I heard that some parishioners felt that my letter dated November 27th was not a true picture of our shortfall situation and that I was alarming parishioners unnecessarily. Now that the year has ended I can prove the estimated figure of \$30,641.26 mentioned in my letter was brought in in two months as follows:

I work many long hours preparing this information and do not release anything that cannot be proved correct and will continue to do so.

Weekly Envelope Information

For the year 1988 we budgeted for Envelope offerings of \$85,000.00 and only received \$72,000.00. This difference was due to the problems we experienced regarding the direction and responsibilities our parish is to take in pastoral matters. Many parishioners held back their financial support until matters were resolved. Therefore for 1989 we have budgeted for the same amount of \$85,000.00 and hope that we will be able to meet it in order to enable us to do the much needed property repairs that were cancelled in 1988.

We began 1988 with 212 families on the parish list, with 185 being envelope holders. During the year we added 17 new families and 15 of them took envelopes.

We ended 1988 with 195 families on the parish list, with 172 being envelope holders. Of the 172, 90 envelopes are used regularly, 62 periodically and 20 are not used at all.

I have given you full details of the financial information of the parish and hopefully the complete Annual Report will be in your hands by February 5th giving you time to study it before the Annual Meeting. I would ask that you please only take one Report per family and bring the Report back with you to the meeting. If you have any questions I will be glad to explain further.

I would like to particularly thank all those parishioners who have given of their time voluntarily in helping with many small jobs about the parish. This has saved us a good deal in expenses -- without them the financial picture would differ. Outside the parish, I would acknowledge Mr. Douglas Wheeler for his trucking services in picking up goods for our Flea Market etc. also for his donation of meats from time to time. I would also, personally, like to thank Mr. Ronald MacNaughton for his considerable commitment in helping me which has been ongoing since I broke my ankle at the beginning of the year.

As always, I have left this to the last. I would like to thank Cynthia Watts for the typing of this Annual Report and the Monthly Statements. My own Company, Maritime Protective Agency Limited for providing the copier equipment for all church activities and All Type Print for the donation of our Report covers.

Rector's Annual Report 1988

Dear Parishioners,

I want to begin these remarks by thanking all of you for supporting the Parish over the past year with your time, talents and financial resources. The future of St. George's will be ensured if everyone takes a share in the life of the parish. Leadership will continue to be developed and encouraged when we understand that ministry is a cooperative work with the clergy. I am very happy to see more and more people coming forward to make a contribution, a trend so clearly indicated by the new faces nominated to Council for the new year.

Many good things happened in the parish this year and we continue to prosper with a lively Sunday community and a reasonably sound financial base. It has of course, been a difficult year as well, both for me and for our parishioners. The controversy raised around the AIDS ministry did much to discourage us all and there is a good deal of healing to be done if the parish is to find its former confidence and direction. I hope the Future Directions Committee, which is to be constituted at the Annual meeting, will be able to begin pointing the parish in the right direction. The difficult question of just how the parish will work out its support to Persons with AIDS will be part of its mandate, as well as looking at the important areas of liturgy, music, child and adult education, community involvement and leadership development.

The parish's ability to provide support to Persons with AIDS will depend upon two things: Your willingness to genuinely reach out to those infected who live on our door steps and their openness and trust to receive that support following the painful events of the past several months. We will all have to build renewed trust if the initial open relationship with Persons with AIDS is to be restored. It would be easy to let it all slip away in the midst of profound difficulties and I hope and pray this does not happen.

We will need to continue building on our liturgical tradition. There is very strong support for the Book of Common Prayer in the parish. Indeed, many of you have come to St. George's because that tradition is here. However, the church at large is struggling with and using the Book of Alternative Services and it seems evident that one day some form of it will become the official Prayer Book of the Anglican Church of Canada. We will have to exercise our responsibility to be a part of the creative process which will ensure our Diocese and National Church remains true to our Christian and

Anglican heritage. This too will be a difficult work and St. George's is in a position to make an important contribution as Anglicans continue with a work which will have enormous impact upon the Canadian Church.

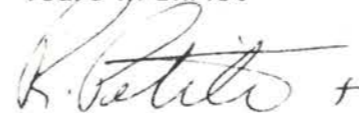
We are very fortunate to have Mr. Neil Houlton as our new Music Director. Neil has already endeared himself to us by his wonderful work at the organ and he is working very hard to build up the choir. We have begun to develop a find music program in the parish and Neil continues by building on the work that David Buley did before him. He will need the support of choir and congregation to do this. We have managed to place a Choir in the Chancel at special services but the regular Sunday Choir is struggling. There are many in our congregation who might give serious consideration to helping with this very important offering during our Sunday Liturgy.

Kenneth Pringle has worked extremely hard with the Servers Guild over the past few years. Ken has decided to step back a little from these responsibilities and perhaps help out as sub-deacon from time to time. I am very grateful that Greg Videtic has offered to take over some of Ken's work and he has already begun by holding a Servers meeting, training sessions and marshaling the servers on Sunday morning and on Feast days. I want to thank Ken for his work and for being the Rector's right-hand man at the Altar. I have always been confident of a task well done when Ken has been involved.

At its last meeting the Parish Council decided to contract out the Sexton's duties and to rent the Sexton's Cottage beginning the end of June. Lenoard and Susan Morash have been our Sextons for five years and we have always been able to be proud of the property during that time. I wish to thank them for their time with us as Sextons and wish them and their family God's blessings in the future.

I extend my very sincere thanks to the outgoing members of Parish Council for their work over the past three years. Three years is a big commitment on a regular basis and I'm sure you will need the rest from the rigors of Council activity. It is very gratifying to see new people come forward to replace those who have to leave. Our new Council is possessed of much talent and the new year should go well.

The past year has been a source of much concern for the growth of our parish. It has been a year of questioning and growth for the Council as they tried to deal with growing tensions and concerns of parishioners.

Due to the considerable debate as to the future of St. George's regarding its christian duties within the community, and in keeping with the doctrine and policies of the Anglican Communion, a Special Open Meeting of Parish Council took place on October 19th with Bishop Hatton in the chair. All parishioners had an opportunity to voice their concerns regarding the pastoral pursuits and high public profile the church had acquired. The meeting was well attended and we came out of it with a more positive attitude and hopefulness for the future of St. George's.

However, the parish finances took a set back this year and did not present a stable financial picture. Despite the efforts and assistance of the Treasurer and the Finance Committee, many of our aims and objectives for the year were not met. The main reason for this was due to reduced contributions in envelope giving. Because of this, for the first time in over three years we had to solicit extra funds to cover oil costs.

In fact, it was only because of a very generous extra contribution from one of our faithful parishioners that we did not end the year in a deficit position. We wish to thank all parishioners who faithfully contributed to the church which enabled us to end the year as well as we did.

However, due to the necessary review of our financial status we had to look to areas where we could reduce our overall expenditures. In this light the position of Sexton was eliminated by Parish Council. We wish to thank Leonard and Susan Morash for their past services and wish them every success in the future.

During the year we were fortunate enough to acquire the services of Mr. Neil Houlton as Music Director replacing Mr. David Buley who resigned. We would like to thank Mr. Buley for his services so well performed and to wish Mr. Houlton every success.

The future of St. George's could be bright indeed, but it will take the united efforts of every parishioner through their continued support spiritually, financially and physically.

Please peruse the many reports of the Annual Report and plan to attend the Annual Meeting. Please do not hesitate to ask any questions that you may have.

A certain loss of vision and sense of direction was suffered in the Parish but I am hopeful that in the coming months these can be regained. Nevertheless, the task of rebuilding will not be a light one and much work is in store for all of us.

I would like to conclude with a word of appreciation and welcome for Neil Houlton. I know we have all enjoyed his fabulous organ playing and support him in his efforts to recover and develop our musical tradition.

Also, because of your generous donations, each shut-in received a lovely **Christmas basket**. We have also endeavoured to respond to **hospital visitations** on a more regular and consistent basis.

This past year has been one of challenge and growth within our parish as we struggled to find the direction our parish should take in pastoral matters. Through keeping an eye on all our christian duties and the various needs of our parish and community, these matters have now been addressed satisfactorily and our faith made stronger in the process. Our parish, along with all other parishes, will share in the **programs** to be undertaken in our Diocese for all those who suffer from **A.I.D.S.**

If there be among you a poor man of one of thy brethren within thy gates in thy land which the Lord thy God giveth thee, thou shalt not harden thine heart, not shut thine hand from thy poor brother: But thou shalt open thine hand wide unto him, and shalt surely lend him sufficient for his need, in that which he wanteth. **Deut.15:7,8.**

During the past year a minimum amount of maintenance has been carried out on the property -- only those things which were absolutely necessary have been attended to in order to keep the properties habitable.

It is with thanks to the efforts of the Treasurer, (who managed to get a grant) that we were able to get any major work done at all. We had 1 person working 8 weeks and the other working 6 weeks all of which was paid through the C.E.I.C. Section 38 Grant. The parish also received \$1,500. to cover the cost of supplies. The Dutch Church was completely painted inside and out. The exterior of the Rectory was completely painted and the exterior of the Hall and Church had all the trim and some touch up work. The interior of the upper White Camel, all wash-rooms in both the Hall and Church were completely repainted and the Upper Hall washed down.

The cold water line in the Church has caused considerable trouble in the past by freezing. This problem has now been corrected by the installation of heat taping with automatic thermal control.

A portion of the basement of the Hall has been made available to the Scouts for a storage area by the erection of a partition for security. Other minor maintenance to windows, doors etc. has also been carried out.

I regret that the finances this year prevented further necessary maintenance because the major portion of the budgeted amount had to be used to meet other commitments. If this unstable financial picture is to continue, the work of the Property Committee cannot be performed in a satisfactory manner and much needed repairs and maintenance will not be able to be carried out.

It was a rather unpleasant duty for me to have to inform Leonard and Susan Morash of the decision to terminate the Sexton position effective May 31st. However upon request an extension was granted until June 30th in order to co-incide with the school year. It was after consideration of finances by Parish Council that it was decided that other arrangements could be made with considerable savings to the parish. I personally wish to thank them both for their past service and wish them well in the future.

I wish to thank, in particular, Jim Rawding who mowed the lawns and maintained the cemetery of the Dutch Church during the summer months. I also wish to thank all those who assisted in any way and hope that in the ensuing year the finances will permit the badly needed work to be done.

A server's main function is to assist their Priest in the celebration of the Holy Eucharist, which is celebrated approximately 180 times throughout the year at St. George's. This number alone might be enough to scare any timid or unseasoned server into thinking there would be little time left for anything else, like a hockey game, a sleep-over or even school (perish the thought). So I hasten to add that roughly 2/3 of these Eucharists are "said Eucharists", that is, without a choir, lasting only 30 minutes and which are served quite well by one server, usually an adult.

So consequently our servers are most visible during the other third of the Eucharists, namely the Choral Eucharist each Sunday morning at 10:30 a.m. at which time there is scheduled a full compliment of 5 servers.

We currently have an active roster of nine servers, faithfully fulfilling their duties, and we would be pleased to welcome any interested, confirmed child or adult. They may contact Dr. Gregory Videtic who has taken on the leadership of St. George's servers and will be their representative on Parish Council.

Congratulations to Scott Connors on receiving his 5 year Server's Cross with its red ribbon and we sincerely hope that he, along with all his fellow-servers will continue to serve God through this humble act, and will find in doing so, the inspiration they need to help them live their daily lives.

After a slow start in September, when only two or three children would appear each Sunday, the church school seems to have settled down to a fairly steady enrolment of six or seven children each week, ranging from 5 to 11 years of age. This is a sufficient number to warrant holding a regular class but it is still an awkward situation for any kind of useful curriculum. There are not enough children to make up two separate classes, so all activities must be planned with all ages in mind. Therefore, the St. George's Church School curriculum continues to be rather ad hoc, tailored to the actual children, rather than any overall "grand plan". Bible stories (usually fitted to the current season of the Church calendar), discussions of simple moral questions, religious songs (mostly of the folk variety) and creative activities which teach about Christianity and the Bible are the main elements of each Sunday's gathering. Fortunately, all of the children who now attend seem to find our classes enjoyable.

Since September, we have read and talked about many of Christ's parables, refreshed the children's memories about some of the Old Testament stories studied last year, discussed several of the traditions and rituals of our Christian worship, learned about some of the common symbols found in church decoration, and presented a Christmas pageant in the church itself on the fourth Sunday in Advent. There has also been a "children's service" at one of the 10:30 a.m. Eucharists, but this was not very well attended. Another is planned for February and should be better.

It has often not been possible to follow our normal pattern of joining the congregation for the last part of the Eucharist service each week, usually because the children have been engaged in activities such as preparing for the Christmas pageant, activities which would have been difficult to terminate quickly, and which the children were very much enjoying.

Two offers of assistance with the Church School have been received and this Spring I hope to arrange some sort of schedule by which an alternate teacher could conduct at least one Church School session a month. Other 10:30 a.m. services in which the children play a part are also part of the plan.

I suspect that the decline in numbers from last year is only a temporary one, and that by June we will have returned to our enrolment of between 10 and 12 which was the maximum number we had last year. This larger enrolment may enable us to rearrange or even divide the present group, for classes which are more focussed on particular age groups. Until that happens, we will soldier on as best we can.
