PARISH OF SAINT GEORGE 1991 ANNUAL MEETING MINUTES

The Annual Meeting was held on February 23, 1992 with forty-five parishoners in attendance. Carmichael Wallace chaired the meeting.

A. OPENING PRAYERS

The meeting opened with prayer by Father Thorne.

B. MINUTES OF ANNUAL MEETING

Minutes of February 17, 1991 meeting were approved. Moved by Susan Harris, seconded Harry Boswell. Motion Carried. The Chairman extended thanks to Robi Matthews, past Secretary, for her good work.

C. UNFINISHED BUSINESS AND BUSINESS ARISING

The Chairman noted there was nothing arising from the annual report and nothing put forward from the floor.

D. COMMUNICATIONS

None

E. FINANCIAL STATEMENT FOR YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 1991

Treasurer, Karen Wheeler, reported a deficit of \$11,692.98 shown in statement.

Points considered were:

- Liabilities of \$14,186.90 used for items as allocated.
- Explanation of Equity shown as \$2,495.02.
- Payment of \$4,013.97 to Edmonds Landscape questioned. Treasurer advised this was a reduction from original bill. The Chairman explained steps had been taken to ensure this expense would not occur again. Treasurer explained cost of current snow removal contract.
- Explanation for Pierceys' expenditures.
- Current mortgage rate 8%. Treasurer advised it is her understanding the mortgage rate is to be reduced to 6%.
- Cost of photocopies covers all photocopying for the Parish.

Adoption of Financial Statement moved by Richard Matthews, seconded by Harry Boswell. Motion Carried.

F. REPORT OF THE RECTOR

Report stands as printed. Father Thorne extended a general thank you to all parishoners for their contributions. He expressed his appreciation to John Swaine, on completion of his two year term as Warden, for his good work and assistance.

G. REPORT OF WARDENS

The Chairman asked for a joint report on items G & H.

John Swaine stressed we continue to grow and develop. He called for any questions re the Synod Report. In response to a question from the floor, he advised an election was not held. Dr. Swaine expressed his views on political aspects of Synod. He encouraged attendance at Synod meeting and participation as solutions to rectifying the politics involved. The Rector is a member of the Diocesan Council this year. The Chairman thanked Dr. Swaine for his work as Warden.

I. CONSIDERATION OF COMMITTEE REPORTS

The Chairman invited Chairpersons of committees to make a brief report if they wish.

SPIRITUAL DEVELOPMENT REPORT

Susan Harris stated there were no additions to the written report. She encouraged all parishoners to participate in our Lenten services. Moved by Susan Harris, seconded by Richard Matthews the report be accepted as presented. Motion Carried.

DIRECTOR OF MUSIC REPORT

Written report stands as submitted. David Buley added that the music program continuation is based on the organ repairs. Moved by David Buley, seconded by Robie Matthews that the report be accepted as presented. Motion Carried.

PROPERTY

No written report. Property administration has been handled by Wardens. Vote of thanks extended to everyone involved with property work.

PASTORAL CARE

Jan Connors spoke briefly on behalf of the committee, explaining that the various activities involve everyone's expertise. The Soup Kitchen is co-ordinated by Karen Wheeler and Cynthia Watts.
SOUP KITCHEN REPORT

Report stands as written. Cynthia Watts addressed the meeting commenting on the benefits received by the parish from the Soup Kitchen. She extended a thank you to people who come every week, and in particular a vote of thanks to Karen Wheeler for her contribution to the Kitchen. The Chairman extended thanks to all volunteers.

All written reports accepted as presented.

J. RECEPTION OF ORGANIZATION REPORTS RESTORATION

Charles Westropp reported on the cupola work. Care must be taken with restoration expenses. At this point, the year 2000 appears to be a practical goal. Report accepted as written.

GABRIEL GUILD

Written report as submitted. Gertrude Moulton informed the meeting, the Guild had a very successful year, contributing approximately \$16,000 to the parish. Thanks was extended to the Guild.

MARY & MARTHA REPORT

Written report as submitted. Sandra Thorne extended an invitation to parishoners to become part of this group.
SUNDAY SCHOOL

Written report as submitted. Cynthia Watts, Superintendent, extended thanks to Mark DeWolfe. She elaborated on the problem of lack of attendance, and commended Mike and Susan Taylor for their work in the Sunday School. She advised that she is unable to continue on as Superintendent as she is leaving for Australia in December, and that there is a requirement for three teachers next year.

NURSERY

Written report as submitted by Sandra Thorne. Mrs. Thorne advised the meeting there are twelve volunteers now and extended thanks to these volunteers. The Chairman added his personal thanks, noting the nursery is a good organization, deserving of support from everyone.

2nd HALIFAX SCOUTING PROGRAM

Written report as submitted. Chris West advised there are twenty-four

young people in various programs. He appealed for suggestions for assistance re the shortage of people on the committee.

The Chairman called for any verbal reports from other committees.

John Swaine reported the Embroidery Committee is making repairs to the Passiontide red frontal, and also making liturgical vestments. The committee is working to improve the parish and make it a better place.

K. BUDGET 1992

The Chairman of the Finance Committee presented the written report of the Finance Committee and 1992 Budget. Mr. Matthews also presented a verbal report on the specific strategy included in the budget and advised that a meeting of the Wardens and Rector, as well as, an extraordinary meeting of Parish Council had been held regarding this budget. Parish Council unanimously approved the operating budget as presented. The Chairman of the Finance Committee provided clarification to points raised regarding expenditures and revenue.

Discussion took place involving suggestions from the floor as to how the deficit could possibly be decreased, the question of payment of the Diocesan allotment as well as the Cathedral restoration contribution.

At this point the Treasurer passed a letter received from the Diocese of Nova Scotia, dated January 31, 1992, thanking the parish for meeting its share of the cost of running the Diocese during the past year, which was read by the meeting Chairman.

David Buley, Director of Music, outlined the services he is providing outside of his contract.

The Rector expressed the view we should always think of our parish in the course of decision making and that the budget has to be considered over time.

The Chairman called for a vote on:

- 1) withholding Diocesan allotment until end of year as recommended or
- 2) carrying on paying allotment

Meeting decision was majority vote for trying to make some kind of payment. The budget was referred to Finance Committee for ongoing review.

The Chairman called for proposals or motions to change the revenue and expenses of 1992 budget, as presented.

Carmichael Wallace moved the Cathedral restoration expense be restored on a regular basis and \$984 was added to expenses. Motion seconded by Cynthia Watts. Amendment passed.

Moved by Karen Wheeler that the North End Area Council expense be increased to \$500. Seconded by Rob Martin. Amendment passed.

Cynthia Watts proposed the 1992 budget revenue unamended, and expenses amended by adding \$100 and \$984 to a total of \$157,715.73 and that the will of this meeting is to make every effort to continue paying the allotment. Motion carried.

Mark DeWolfe, who was not in attendance, was nominated for the Board of Governors, King's College subject to his agreement.

Motion to adjourn by Rob Martin at 3:00 PM. Agreed.

Knowing God and Serving Him - Rector's Report

My prayer is that every parishoner has come to know God more intimately and love Him more intensely this year. In everything that has been said and done in our Parish, the prayer is that someone's mind and heart has been touched by the consuming fire of the Truth and Love of God in Jesus Christ, through the operation and working of the Holy Spirit. If your life has not felt the presence of God in a powerful way in the past year, maybe it is time to make an appointment with a minister, priest, or mature Christian friend, to sit down and talk about it. The committee and organization reports contained in this Annual Report attest to only some of the many exciting and wholesome events, activities and efforts that continuously are springing up in our Parish, but the real activity and miracle has to be the deepening of your life in Jesus Christ. I know that God is working a miracle in so many lives at St. George's - don't be left behind.

I can only pray that each of you knows how grateful I am to Almighty God for bringing my life in contact with each of you. In so many cases your sacrificial efforts are not able to be noticed by many others, and if I have neglected to adequately express my appreciation for your work to the Glory of God, please forgive me. You would be surprised, perhaps, if you could tune in to my private prayers and hear your name mentioned in gratitude, when I have failed to thank you personally. We are truly a spiritual family which God has richly blessed in 1992.

And now to the future. I have some ideas of how we might organize ourselves in the next few years and I will present this proposal at the Annual Meeting. I call my proposal 'St. George's Renewal (Renaissance?) 2000: Building on the last 200 years - preparing for the next 200 years.' I suggest that a small group of individuals begin planning right away with the intention of completing the overall plan by the time of the next Annual Meeting. The actual work would be done during the seven years, 1994 - 1999, with our bi-centennial celebrations in the year 2000. The types of activities I am thinking of might include:

Church Building Conservation

Our eager and competent task force is intent on doing everything possible to make the pieces fall together by the year 2000. They have a very involved and challenging few years ahead of them as they arrange structural and design studies, refine and articulate the final proposal for church building conservation, execute a major external fund raising campaign, quarantee the involvement of all levels of government and especially Parks Canada, and, please God, award the actual contracts and oversee the work to completion. Their creative and enterprising success with Phase One of their task - the resoration of the organ - gives us good hope that the conservation of St. George's church building by the year 2000 will be accomplished.

ParishProperties

Are we using our physical resources to best advantage to carry on the work of Jesus Christ and be true to His Gospel? Although the church itself must remain our primary focus, a small group of parishoners should begin to think about the rationalization and use of the rectory, sexton's cottage and hall. Short and long term goals for these buildings and a maintenance plan should be considered. The Little Dutch Church remains our responsibility and must

not be neglected.

Landscape

For several years now there has been interest in the possibility of using some of the land around the church to construct an ecology garden which might include a period garden, a wooded area, and an attempt to contribute to our community with a project of urban agriculture. This project would allow the children and young people of our area to discover and participate in God's creative work as they experience gardening first hand. Regardless of the extent of these suggestions, it is nonetheless true that the property must have an overall plan re. landscape which includes fences, use of soil, land acquisition (between upper parking lot and the school), and overall attractiveness.

Congregational Development

Our theme might be "Doubling our congregation by the year 2000" as we participate in the worldwide Anglican Church's Decade of Evangelism. There are many positive things that a small group of parishoners could do to get the message out that St. George's is a community which welcomes sinners and offers all persons the free Grace and Love of God in Jesus Christ as we receive it by His Goodness. The emphasis is on the unchurched - those who are not associated with a city parish and whom God has begun to stir their hearts to seek Him in His church. Will they know about us? Will they feel welcome and be fed spiritually when they do come? Will God be able to use St. George's as an instrument of His Grace to bring them to a saving relationship with Himself through His Son Jesus Christ?

Spiritual Development

Here the emphasis is more on the growth in Christ of those who are already associated with our parish spiritual family. Such activities as Bible Studies, Missions, Household Theology groups, Prayer Sessions, Study Groups, etc, all can help to encourage our spiritual maturity. Our Sunday morning liturgy in which we we work so hard to worship God in beauty and truth, as well as our weekday worship, are essential to this goal. Youth must become a greater focus for us.

Pastoral Care

This includes the many dimensions of pastoral care to the needy within our congregation as well as our caring outreach to the community. The challenges within our congregation are demanding, but the opportunities to respond to the Love of Christ in reaching out to our community are endless. We must become more intentional in our outreach programme and set goals for the type of care we feel best able to offer in the name of Jesus.

Stewardship

I consider the establishment of a Stewardship Committee to be essential. Stewardship challenges us to reflect upon our response to the Love of God which has been shown to us in Jesus Christ, and works in us by the power of the Holy Spirit. We are such talented people with numerous exceptional gifts. How do we respond to God in His Church by the use of our time, talents, resources and money? What is an appropriate 'Christian Lifestyle'? A creative Stewardship Committee can help to bring to the surface many 'hidden treasures' in St. George's congregation. Obviously the scope and intensity of the activities outlined above are

beyond the potential of those individuals presently working so hard for Jesus Christ now in this parish. Only the involvement of new persons and a renewed commitment of present parishoners who are not presently overburdened, can accomplish these suggestions for 'St. George's Renewal 2000'.

Publication of Parish History

The historical and architectural significance of St. George's Church cannot be disputed. Nathalie Clerk tells us that St. George's Church "conforms more closely than any other Canadian church" to the architectural principles laid out by Andrea Palladio. (*Palladian Style in Canadian Architecture*) Ottawa: Environment Canada, 1984.) There is great interest in the original construction and evolution of our building, as evidenced by the attention and priority that Parks Canada gives to it. The Little Dutch Church is also a national treasure. The social history of St. George's plays a significant part in the history of the city of Halifax which celebrates a major anniversity in 1999. It is quite natural that a book be published to document the history of St. George's parish from the early years of the German mission in the 1750s to the present. Perhaps a major lecture on some aspect of the architechural or social history could be given annually on St. George's Day, 1994 - 99? Possibilities sould be explored by an interested group.

There are many other efforts that might be even more crucial to our spiritual growth and well being during the remainder of this decade as we prepare for our bi-centennial celebrations, but these are my immediate thoughts. Can St. George's expand sufficiently to accomplish such things? By God's grace only. If Jesus Christ touches hearts and minds and reminds us who we are - His children who live by His grace - great things are possible.

WARDENS' BEEORT

When preparing this year's wardens' report we looked for guidance in the past two annual reports. Hubert Morgan and John Swaine the last two senior wardens were very upbeat in their reports, noting the spiritual development of the parish and growth of the many worthy activities that the congregation is involved with. Over the last two years we have lived through difficult times — a vicious recession, and even in a country as blessed as Canada, some appalling social and moral problems. This year has been especially difficult — in the words of the Queen an "annus horribilis". We are happy to report that Saint George's has not only survived but continued to build both spiritually and in new members.

Father Thorne in his 1990 rector's report asked for understanding and co-operation amongst what was then a sometimes fractious congregation. Saint George's is by nature a church of diverse people with different ideas of how they can best serve God. The rector in a recent sermon noted that people expressed their faith in many different ways while contributing to the life of the parish. I am convinced that under the rector's leadership we are now well on the way toward working together for the common good. I think that we have "developed a spiritual community that grows together in mutual respect and love".

It is not intended to single out the works of any particular committee or group but we would like to thank all who have contributed to the spiritual and material growth of the church. The recent disappearance of the organ for a long overdue refit is a special case as the whole congregation by their work and generous donations have made this possible.

The years ahead will not be easy for the church in general and Saint George's in particular. With prayer and vigilance and a lot of hard work we should be able to preserve our church and the values it stands for. Richard and I thank the rector for his leadership and all parishioners for their support over the past year.

REPORT OF SYNOD DELEGATES

Diocesan Synod convened on May 21, 1992, and sat until Saturday May 23. Among the 101 clergy and 229 lay delegates, the Rector, Rob Martin, and I were the Parish delegates. This report is not the place for a polemic on the state of the Church in Nova Scotia as reflected in its Diocesan Synod and I shall reluctantly refrain from writing one. Members of the Parish are, however, strongly encouraged to attend synod in the future and to sit in the observer's gallery and form their own opinions. I would strongly urge, however, that you not make it a test of your faith or of your willingness to continue to attend Church.

The Bishop's Charge raised the intention to create a non-stipendiary ordained ministry, with a preparation outside the traditional seminary, that would have specialties and specialized ministries other than those of broadly trained professional clergy, and that would be licensed for specific functions in specific places. This was not a matter of discussion before synod, although there was much speculation abroad about its purposes, usefulness, and effects. The motions before synod were relatively few, and on face value seemingly innocuous. The first dealt with Canon 16.

Canon 16 respecting the budget process was altered to make it more difficult to establish funds which are exempt from allotment. Each expenditure or fund to be allotment free now must be approved in advance by the Parish Relations Committee. What was before a clear, categorical process with defined rules, is now subject to the goodwill of the committee. There was considerable discussion on this issue. In the first vote on May 21 it was tabled by a vote of 119 to 116. On May 22, however, through what was perceived by many to be a most extraordinary procedure, it was taken from the table and passed.

Motions two and three dealt with the Archives Committee and the ability to appoint a diocesan archivist. Motion four repealed Canon 15 which provided for a diocesan layman's council.

There was much discussion of the recommendation of the Task Force on Episcopal Ministry which had recommended adding to the number of bishops and dividing the diocese into areas. The idea appeared to be clearly undesirable to a large and diverse group in synod; it was not brought directly to a vote but sent off for further study. A subsequent motion from the Regional Council of the Eastern Shore proposed the disbanding of the Task Force. Synod clearly thought that impolitic and defeated the motion.

A further motion introduced on behalf of the Regional Council of the Eastern Shore raised the only other controversy of substance at the synod which was Motion 8:

Resolved that this Diocesan Synod of Nova Scotia,

Upholds the teaching that, for Christians, human sexual relations are properly to be found within the covenant of Christian marriage, namely, the union of one male and one female in a faithful relationship; and therefore,

b) that any person in Holy Orders, or seeking Holy Orders, who openly declares an intention to lead a life contrary to the same, should be disciplined by the Church in Christian love for the purpose of bringing about repentance and visible attempt (sic) to lead the new life in Christ.

The motion was defeated by a majority of two to one.

It is with some considerable relief that I have been able to decline being the among the Parish delegates for the 1993 sitting.

SAINT GEORGE'S CHURCH FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT 1992

1992 began on a challenging note for your Finance Committee. The decision taken at the Annual Meeting in February to accept a budget that included a \$20,000 deficit (after assuming a 10 percent increase in giving) created two immediate priorities: to try to find ways to increase revenue; and to attempt to hold the line on expenditures.

We were successful in negotiating a \$20,000 loan from the diocese to cover costs incurred in 1991 associated with the conservation project. (This amount was in addition to the budgeted \$20,000 deficit.) The initial terms of this loan combined with our existing mortgage resulted in a heavy monthly burden which we subsequently renegotiated on a more favourable basis. Parish Council now has a firm policy that no more conservation work will be charged to our operating expenses.

Other difficult decisions taken during the year included the regrettable necessity of not renewing Fr. Richard Smith's appointment and of launching the deficit reduction appeal.

Faced by all of this fiscal adversity, the parish responded magnificently. Weekly giving in 1992 increased by 14.6 percent. In addition, contributions to the deficit reduction appeal amounted to \$7,000. As well, gifts and pledges to the Organ Restoration Fund reached the goal of \$80,000. What a tribute to the faith in action of the parishioners of Saint George's!

Thanks to this generosity, we have ended the year with a deficit of only \$6,000.

Our guidelines for developing the 1993 budget were to maintain the parish's current level of activity without increasing expenditures. The resulting budget projects that, with a 15 percent increase in weekly giving, the parish will be in the black by the end of 1993.

It is only because of the parish's spiritual vitality that we anticipate that we will be able to achieve financial stability.

Spiritual Development Report

Lent

On Sundays before Evening Prayer, Father Smith led a Study Group on St. Augustine's <u>Handbook on Faith, Hope and Charity.</u> Approximately twenty people attended these sessions. Father B.C. Strople, a retired priest of this Diocese, gave the addresses at the Good Friday three-hour Service. Books of a devotional nature were made available for purchase during coffee hour, under the supervision of Scott Thomas.

Ascension

Father Peter Toon, professor at Nashota House, a theological seminary in Wisconsin, preached in the parish on the Sunday after Ascension.

The Fall and Advent

On October 18, Father John Cranston, a noted missioner and retired priest now living in New Hamshire, visited St. George's. He preached at the 10:30 am Holy Communion and then met with some parishoners at a potluck luncheon. He spoke on parish leadership.

From October 25 to November 29, Father Smith conducted another Study Group on Sundays at 6 pm. This time the subject was a book by Bishop John Jewel <u>An Apology of the Church of England.</u>

Also in the Fall, a number of people took responsibility for pre-baptismal visitation and sponsorship of families and individuals. This contact between regular parishoners and those being prepared for baptism or parents of infants, provides an important link with the parish.

Father Thorne preached a series of fine sermons during Advent at Evening Prayer on "Death, Judgement, Heaven and Hell."

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The choir and music programme continue to prosper under the direction of David Buley. The Sunday School is also flourishing. It's new superintendent, Mrs. Susan Taylor, and her assistants have a well-organized programme and the children are enjoying their classes. Father Smith has served the parish faithfully this year and we have greatly appreciated his continued assistance in the Fall when we were no longer able to financially reimburse him for his dedicated service.

Finally, we can be truly thankful for Father Thorne's wise guidance through another year.

DIRECTOR OF MUSIC

Annual Report, 1992

Our Rector's report for 1991 suggested that there would be many challenges ahead in the slaying of dragons. Ever since my first connection with this Parish, I have been trying to slay - or at least rehabilitate - a certain dragon. On January 15th (1993), not quite one year after an appeal for help in this slaying, it was thrilling for me to help with the beast's final dismantling. I speak, of course, about the beautiful, but fatigued, organ. She has breathed her last! She shall be transformed and rise - no longer a dragon but a phoenix - to fill the church with sound once again later on this year.

1992 was a remarkable year, musically, in this Parish and the future promises to be more so. A strong campaign was mounted to have the organ properly repaired. I write this with deep gratitude that the Parish has responded so well to this campaign that we are now without an organ! The absence of the instrument will provide us all with a wonderful opportunity to become more confident singers - a cappella - and the organ's return - in working order - will significantly increase the ability to colour and accompany this singing so as to make the musical effects even better than before. (Perhaps many are unaware that I had to play at one half to nearly full volume most of the time because whole sections of the organ were "stuck" on! Loudest is not always the most musical, however, and it will be wonderful to be able to create quiet, contemplative sounds as well.) I wish to publicly thank John Swain, Chairman and the other members of the Organ Fund Raising Comittee for helping with the project. Also, I am grateful to Hugh Tilley and the Restoration Task Force for overseeing the whole operation.

In addition to the progress with the organ, the choir has gone from strength to strength.

The choristers rehearse regularly on Friday evenings and Sunday mornings and the youngest members of the choir attend a choir school on Wednesday evenings. The arduos work of preparing an increasing amount of choral music for our services is rewarded by being able to sing this wonderful music liturgically, season by season through the Church year. Repertoire that has been added this year includes Communion settings by Thomas Tallis, Charles Wood, Orlando Gibbons and Harold Darke; settings of the Magnificat and Nunc Dimitts by Herbert Sumsion and Herbert Howells; anthems and motets by such diverse composers as Maurice Duruflé, Orlando Gibbons, G.F. Handel, Howells, Olivier Messiean and Tallis. It is indeed a privilege to be able to sing, on behalf of the congregations, these timeless praises to God.

Weekday services were sung on the Feasts of The Epiphany of Our Lord, William Laud, Ash Wednesday, Wednesday in Holy Week, Maundy Thursday, Easter Vigil, Saint George's Day, Ascension Day, Wednesday in Rogationtide, the 17th of October, All Souls' Day, Christmas Eve and Christmas Day. Special Sunday evening services were sung on The Sunday after Christmas, St. Michael and All Angels and Advent Sunday. In addition, the choir made singing visits to Northwood Manor, Sunrise Manor and the Victoria General Hospital and sang a service of Choral Evensong in the Parish of Saint Augustine's, Lake Echo.

We were very fortunate to receive a substantial amount of choral music from the Anglican Choir School of Prince Edward Island which is no longer in operation. This gift has been a great help in providing legal copies of music for the choristers. The costs of legitimate music publishing are very high and donations of this kind, in any number, are always welcome. Thank you to those within the Parish who have also contributed to the music programme by making memorial donations of music for the choir.

New choristers since the 1991 report include: Vaila Mowatt, Chelsea Thorne, Beth Archibald, Michael Archibald, Daina Kulnys, Aniko Lewton-Brain, Michael Henderson, Janice Neal and Adrian Sly and we have welcomed back to the stalls: Jane (Reagh) Bruce-Robertson, Martha Pratt and Bruce Archibald. These additional voices bring our full choir attendance to a total of 31 members. This often makes for very cosy seating arrangements - perhaps a good thing with the temperatures of the church as low as they were toward the end of the year!

The choir has been offered the opportunity to sing the daily services for a week in each of Exeter Cathedral and Worcester Cathedral in England in July of 1994. Our preparations for these services involves the singing of a number of services of Evensong in this Parish during the next two years. Also, we shall be preparing repertoire for a concert and holding special events both within and outside of the Parish as we attempt to defray some of the costs of this tour. We are excited by the prospect of this tour and hope that the members of the Parish will join us in our enthusiasm in the next year and a half.

My work with the choir and for the parishoners of Saint George's continues to be very rewarding. We can all anticipate wonderful things in the year ahead: the re-dedication of the organ and the services and concerts that will surround that event, an increasing choral presence in the offering of worship in the Parish and the knowledge that all of us have helped to preserve a fine instrument, as well as the tradition of music in this historic Parish.

HOSPITAL CHECKS

Kathlyn Patterson (VG), Ruth Anthony (Infirmary/Camp Hill) and Lita Rodrique (IWK) are key examples of such individuals. Also Mary Martin who fills i occasionally for Ruth. On an ongoing basis, all year round, they watch for names of parishioners and residents of our parish community who may be admitted to hospital, and advise the Rector.

VISITING PROGRAM

The shut-in visiting program has already received much publicity in the newsletter and has resulted in several additional "visitors" to the team. Thank you is extended to Roy Currie who left the role of Coordinator mid year. Dorothy Coons is Roy's capable successor. Visitors, thanks to each one of you for the special way you touch the life of another.

MANOR VISITS

In 1992 a schedule was developed for the manor services at Gordon B. Isnor and Sunrise Manor which St. George's participates in. Father Thorne takes one service each month and lay people take the other. 2nd Halifax Venturers (Amanda Patterson and Tanya Connors) and the Gabriel Guild have each lead one of the services (usually a shortened Evening Prayer with meditation) while individual members of the committee or congregation (Scott Thomas, Margherita Mendel and Gai Thomas) teamed up for others. At Victoria Hall we responded to a request to lead the World Day of Prayer service and we returned again in the Fall to offer a service of Evening Prayer to the residents. Thanks to Robi Matthews, Ron Clarke, Karen Conrod and Margherita Mendel.

COMMUNITY AWARENESS FAIR

This event, held November 22nd at coffee hour, brought to St. George's representatives and displays from the Metro Food Bank, Homes for Independent Living, SEARCH, CARAS, Ecology Action Centre, City of Halifax Drug Awareness Program, Coverdale, Breakthrough, Youth Help Line, Adsum House, Phoenix House, Halifax Police Department Charlie Zone, Halifax Metro Welfare Rights and Stepping Stone. It was well received, by the parish and groups alike.

CHRISTMAS OUTREACH

Through the support of individual parishioners the Christmas outreach included baskets to shut-ins, Mental Health Association, food hampers & turkeys, and adopt-a-family.

MISSION FUNDS

A proposal for expending accumulated "mission funds" was submitted, discussed and revised resulting in financial support to the North End Area Council, Inner City Youth Club, City Centre Ministry, Bethany Place as well as providing discretionary funds for the needy under the Rector's control.

We have been less successful yet we're still working on the <u>Bulletin Board</u> and finding the appropriate way to <u>Greet</u> guests at St. George's.

A separate report has been prepared on the <u>Soup Kitchen</u>. However I would like to thank Karen Wheeler and Cynthia Watts for all their continued efforts as Coordinators.

SOUP KITCHEN REPORT

Each year we report to you that the St. George's Soup Kitchen continues to operate most successfully; and it is with joy that we can say this again for 1992.

1992 was a very important year in our history. On November 9th we celebrated a full seven years of operation which coincided beautifully with the dedication of the Soup Kitchen to MABLE DESSIE ROBERTS WAINWRIGHT on November 8th. At the same time we presented Certificates of Appreciation to all 32 groups. Over 200 people attended and it was most definitely a time of celebration.

Since opening in 1985 the number of people coming through the doors has nearly doubled and consequently the cost of operation has increased. Yet, when we call for funds, our needs are met. The 32 groups who prepare the meals are generous and hardworking and the food they provide is, simply put, 'as good as mother's'.

At the present time we are averaging about 130 per Saturday -- some days reaching 160 people. Times are hard and it is certainly noticeable to us in the Soup Kitchen.

We have 6 teams from St. George's and would like to have at least 8, so that each team does not have to come more than once every two months. We therefore, invite anyone in the parish who would like to share in this important mission to contact the writers.

There are simply too many people to thank individually for the continuing smooth operation of the soup kithcen, but our heartfelt appreciation is forever on our lips and in our hearts. A long time ago Mable Wainwright gave us A Little Book of Thoughtful Verse by John Oxenham. It was obviously a book she referred to often for it is page weary and well marked by pen. One of the verses she has marked is as follows:

There is no sin His Love can not forgive:
His mercy endureth for ever!

No soul so stained His Love will not receive;

His mercy endureth for ever!

No load of sorrow but His touch can move,

No hedge of thorns that can withstand His Love;

For the tenderness of God

Is from age to age the same,

And His Mercy endureth for ever!

This is a thought we try to carry with us at all times when we meet those who are in trouble, sorrow, sickness and pain each and every Saturday.

Two significant events took place in early 1992. The Parks Service of Canada produced a "Heritage Character Statement" which in short stated that they would be prepared to participate in the preservation of the church in its present state. Secondly, Marina Kavanagh, a student at the School of Architecture of the Technical University of Nova Scotia completed a detailed history of the structure of the church. This history which was funded by Heritage Nova Scotia will provide an invaluable source document as we proceed with the conservation of the Church. The main thrust of the structural history is that the building has changed as the needs of the parish have changed and that it would be difficult to determine a specific date to base the restoration of the church on. Conserving the church in its present form seems to be the sensible way to proceed.

Our architect, Mac McKay of Fowler Bauld and Mitchell, has been working closely with Conservation Task Force Project Manager, Hugh Tilley, to complete the Project Definition work so that we can proceed with our negotiations with the Parks Service and the Province. This bureaucratic but very important part of conservation is progressing on schedule and I would like to thank Hugh for keeping us on track.

Phase 1 of Saint George's 2000, the restoration of the organ, is well on the way to becoming a reality. The generosity of the parish during the Phase 1 fundraising has provided enough funds to go into contract with Mr Letourneau, the organ builder. On January 15 Mr Letourneau and a troop of volunteers under John Swaine loaded the organ into a moving van which was last seen heading for the factory in Sainte-Hyacinthe Quebec. The organ should return good as new during August of this year. While this work is going on it is planned to build a platform in the organ space that will allow another access to the church underneath the organ. This will provide another fire exit and take the pressure off those preparing for worship in the vestry.

I would like to thank all who have donated to the Phase 1 fundraiser and all members of Dr. Swaine's team who have worked so diligently on this project. I must, however, remind everyone that it is important to honour all our pledges as these funds are now committed.

With the organ repair well underway our challenge for this year is to ensure that we keep focussed on the overall conservation of the church. I am convinced that we have the drive and the faith to reach our goal by the year 2000 or even before!

Gabriel Guild: "We Strive to Bear One Another's Burdens"

From September to May in 1992, twenty-two Gabriel Guild members met at 8 p.m. on the 2nd and 4th Tuesdays. Annual dues were \$3.00 and Georgina Myles faithfully collected loose change at the end of each meeting.

<u>Practical Projects</u> included the traditional Red Rose Dinner, Turkey Dinner, Pancake Supper and Card Party, Penny Auction, pantry and craft sales, a barbecue, and catering to weddings, dinners, brunches, and a garden party. Two guest from Kenya spoke on religious and social issues in their country. Members also led Sunday devotions at G.B. Isnor Manor.

<u>Social Activities</u> included performing a "Mummer Act" at the Diocesan Centre, a baby shower for a member, a Christmas dinner, and the sharing with Christian friends during craft and refreshment times at meetings.

1992 has been a kind year to St. George's nursery crew. We have had a great time due to the support of many of the workers and parents.



2nd HALIFAX SCOUTING PROGRAM

The present Scouting year, of which we are half way through has been and still is a very trying experience. We started in September having our previous three sections; Beavers, Cubs and Scouts off to a rocky and rough beginning compounded by having struggled all summer with trying to work on setting up a Venturer Company for 14-18 year olds.

Beavers had one adult leader and two youth. Cubs had one adult leader and eight youth. Scouts had three adult leaders and nine youth. Venturers had one potential new leader and two youth.

By November it had become clear that we had better start consolidating our resources and talent in order to survive. To that end we suspended having a Beaver Colony for 5, 6 and 7 year olds until there appeared to us to be more of a need for Scouting at this age group in our area. Also at the Venturer Company level we lost the interest of one of the two youth and our potential new leader became a very busy university student. So our one remaining youth joined forces with another fledging group in our area in order to carry out a Venturer program. That one remaining youth also has joined forces with our Scout Troop to become part of the leadership team.

Our Cub Pack has had its problems also; In Scouting we have ratio requirements, i.e. six youth to one leader. As you can see, with one adult and eight boys we had a problem. We have spent time and effort trying to recruit at least one more leader on a full time basis. But instead we have one part-time adult and this continues to be a source of concern.

In spite of all our organizational headaches we have been able to carry out somewhat of an active program at the two remaining sections.

Cubs have been swimming, working on environment projects, crafts and having fun. A winter and spring camp are planned for the up coming months.

The Scout Troop has carried out a very successful fundraising effort in order for nine youth and three leaders to participate in the upcoming 8th Canadian Scout Jamboree, to be held in Kananaskis Country, Alberta July 10 to 18, 1993.

As you can see from our Treasurer's report chocolate bars do sell and do produce the necessary results.

Now they must do a lot of camping, cooking, swimming and learning to get prepared to live outdoors with fifteen thousand participants for nine glorious days.

In order for the Scouting program to work and flourish it is dependant on <u>Volunteers</u>; people who would be willing to:

serve on committees
provide transportation
do telephoning
cook at upcoming banquets
keep notes at meetings
keep records of finances
help with some badge teaching
help with providing new and fresh points of view
people who are willing to be part of a leadership team.

Yes, you can help!

Sometimes, because we are few in numbers it is easy to overlook the importance of the "needs of this community" that we are trying to service. Each Scouting year we find that we have youth in our program that come from what we often refer to as "one parent" or "no parent" environments. This can provide for some challenging situations, to try and give them every opportunity to participate in things that other children just take for granted, i.e. camping, canoeing and uniforms.

No we can't be everything to all; but we at St. George's try our best to fulfil the Aims and Principles of Scouting. The Aim of the organization is to help its members develop their character as resourceful and responsible members of the community by providing opportunities and guidance for their mental, physical, social and spiritual development.

- c) Community Involvement
- d) Ecumenical Affairs
- e) Sharing of information and methods among parishes
- f) Promoting fellowship and worship
- g) Planning for the future in regional and parish life
- h) To initiate, respond to, and implement diocesan and regional programs
- i) Any other areas as may be determined
- j) The missionary work of the church

In a letter from our new Regional Dean, Rev'd. John C. Smith, dated December 30th, 1992:

It (is) recognized that there is much diversity in liturgical style and thrust of evangelism among the eight parishes, yet, there seems an earnest desire to work together more closely, while accepting that diversity....

Over the next few months, we hope to be able to bring before parishes some concrete suggestions for action. As always, there is some potential costs for any programs, and I have been asked to write you to consider placing in your parish budget for 1993, or setting aside a reserve of \$300.00 for regional programs, if required.

This idea I presented to our Parish Council as the representative for Regional Council. Parish Council voted not to give or allocate any such funds. Whilst disappointed with this result, I personally resolve to work even harder to have our Parish Council and parish come to understand and work more closely with the Regional Council.

Canon 35, Part "D" states: 2) It shall be the responsibility of every parish and Parish Council to actively co-operate with the other parishes in the region, and support the regional council in its endeavors.
