MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING OF THE PARISH OF SAINT GEORGE, 23 FEBRUARY 2003

Approximately 80 parishioners were in attendance.

The meeting was opened with a prayer.

Minutes. Moved by Patricia Martinson, seconded by John Hammond, that the minutes of the 2002 Annual General Meeting of the Parish of Saint George be approved as circulated. Carried.

Business Arising. None.

Communications. None.

Special YouthNet Presentation. There was a brief presentation relating to ongoing work on the Saint George's YouthNet web presence, noting particularly the work of volunteers Allistair Fraser and Harold Godsoe.

General Reports.

Rector's Report. Father Thorne thanked the Parish for its support of his Doctoral studies. He thanked parishioners for being members of the visible Body of Christ in the community, as is evident in the reports of the pastoral teams, in the work of YouthNet, and in other aspects of the Parish's outreach. He noted his confidence that this work would continue during his upcoming sojourn in the Golan Heights. He expressed particular thanks for the contributions of David Buley, Anna Paton, Stephen Blackwood, and Father Eldie Richard.

Wardens' Report. Stephen Blackwood, speaking on behalf of Anne Read, Anna Paton, and Tracy Lenfesty, drew parishioners' attention to the Wardens' Report in the Annual Report, stressing especially the need for a regular secretarial presence in the Parish. He thanked Father Thorne for allowing the Parish to participate in the completion of his Doctoral thesis, and presented gifts to the rector on behalf of the parish: a photograph of the congregation taken from the sanctuary, and a carved cross commissioned from a woodworker in the Parish.

Music Director's Report. David Buley thanked the Parish for welcoming him back in the capacity of Music Director, and thanked the choir for its ongoing volunteer efforts.

Reports of Standing Committees.

Finance Committee. In lieu of Stuart Gray, Mary Martin presented a Financial Statement for the year 2002. She thanked particularly Leslie Jaeger for his work on finance matters at the Diocesan level.

Moved by Mary Martin, seconded by Lowell Perry, that the 2002 Financial Statement be

approved as circulated. Carried.

In lieu of Stuart Gray, Mary Martin presented the 2003 Budget for the Parish of Saint George. She noted particularly that the budgets was predicated on the assumptions that Allotment would be paid in full and that the budget would be balanced. Moved by Mary Martin, seconded by Jan Connors, that the 2003 Budget for the Parish of Saint George be adopted as presented. Carried.

Property Committee. Ian Tillard gave an overview of the Committee's ongoing work relating to the present state of the Hall and Rectory, possible scenarios for their future development, and to the financial implications of these. He invited parishioners to bring their ideas and skills relevant to these questions to the attention of the Committee. Parish Historian Dr. Henry Roper gave a brief description of the histories of the two buildings. Moved by Patricia Martinson, seconded by Ian Tillard, that the Property Committee be instructed to explore various alternative scenarios for Hall development and report to a Special Meeting of the Parish by 30 April 2003. Carried.

Spiritual Development Committee. Moved by Neil Robertson, seconded by Jane Mason-Brown, that the Reports of the Music Director, Altar Guild, Servers, and Daily Offices be approved as circulated. Carried.

Pastoral Ministry Committee. Derek Mitchell offered a brief presentation on the Inner City Initiative and Saint George's participation in it.

Moved by Derek Mitchell, seconded by Jan Connors, that Jim Baker be nominated as the Parish's official representative on the board of the Inner City Initiative. Carried. Moved by Patricia Martinson, seconded by John Hammond, that the reports presented by the Pastoral Ministry Committee be approved as circulated. Carried.

Stewardship Committee. Moved by Jan Connors, seconded by Sandra Thorne, that the reports presented by the Stewardship Committee be approved as circulated. Carried.

Groups and Organizations. Moved by Vaila Mowat, seconded by Neil Robertson, that the reports of Groups and Organizations be approved as circulated. Carried.

Nominations Committee. All nominees put forward by the Committee were elected.

Moved by Patricia Martinson, seconded by Ian Tillard, that the 2003 Annual General Meeting of the parish of Saint George be adjourned. Carried.

The meeting closed with prayers.

General Reports

Rector's Report

Soon after the terrible events of September 11, 2001 a novelist wrote "If the hijackers had been able to imagine themselves into the thoughts and feelings of the passengers, they would have been unable to proceed. It is hard to be cruel once you permit yourself to enter the mind of your victim. Imagining what it is like to be someone other than yourself is at the core of our humanity." Of course it is possible to push this insight back several steps and suppose that the real failure of the imagination occurred generations ago when the affluent nations of the west were not able to imagine themselves into the thoughts and feelings of the people of the Middle East.

At Saint George's we understand the importance of the Christian imagination, redeemed by Christ. It is through the imagination that we place ourselves at each other's disposal as parishioners. Knowing our own inner struggles, we imagine ourselves into the thoughts and feelings of one another. This imagining is not for 'judging' the other, but in order to minister to the other. To use language perhaps offensive to the outsider but Scriptural, we allow ourselves to be 'used' by the other whenever such usefulness is for the good of their soul and the building up of the Body of Christ. Indeed, it is hard to be cruel once we permit ourselves to enter the mind and heart of another. And that is why sometimes we stubbornly refuse to attempt to imagine ourselves into the thoughts and feelings of another – we are just set on disliking another, or determined to disapprove of their Calchehaviour or lifestyle. We know that the proper use of our imagination would

break down the dividing wall of hostility between us, yet for one reason or other we decide to maintain that wall and dwell securely behind it in the dungeon of our soul.

The use of the Christian imagination is a demand of divine justice, as demonstrated by the ministry of Jesus Christ. Although He saw into the thoughts, feelings, minds and hearts of each one of us, He still had to undergo the agony of the cross, and He tells us plainly that we shall be judged. Imagining ourselves into the mind and heart of another does not mean that the other is not accountable for his or her actions, but rather that we share their future with them. As members of the Body of Christ we have a shared future. When one weeps we all weep. When one rejoices we all rejoice.


During 2003 I spent more than half the year in a place in the Middle East where the God-given gift of imagination is creative, fertile and rich, yet unredeemed. Unredeemed in that two peoples, the Jew and the Arab, have determined that the only way to survive is to refuse to enter compassionately into the thoughts and feelings of the other. That dividing wall of hostility is maintained and they have decided that their good and their peace will not be together in relation to God and to each other. They insist that their God is not the same. They insist that they are not true neighbours and in their imaginations they push the other to the outer edge of what it is to be human – and perhaps further.

I am profoundly grateful to the parish for allowing me the opportunity to minister to Canadian troops on the Syria/Israel border for six months in 2003. I know that for so many of you my presence there was an extension of the ministry of our parish. It is a testimony to your commitment to the Christian imagination that this parish is so keen to imagine itself into the thoughts, feelings, hearts and minds of peoples throughout the world. Each time we pray in this way, especially in our intercessions during the Holy Communion, we become more human, put on the mind of Christ, and are prepared to ascend with him in contemplation to our Father in Heaven. In a sermon preached in Jerusalem just three weeks ago The Archbishop of Canterbury noted that Dietrich Bonhoeffer, just before he was executed for his resistance to Hitler, observed that the churches in 1930's Germany had lost credibility by concentrating only on their own problems and demanding their own freedom. They failed to use their redeemed imaginations to think themselves into the hearts of their neighbours who were most appallingly at risk, the Jews of Germany. As I write this I know our own Anglican Communion is facing a serious crisis and

we have been fasting and praying as a parish for the unity of the Church. Yet being the Body of Christ also means that we bear and show forth the loving wounds of Christ. These wounds of Love are deep enough to receive and overcome all the sin of this world. By the grace of God may Saint George's continue to be the Body of Christ to a broken world.

For being part of this wonderful parish I am truly thankful to Almighty God. In particular, I wish to express my thankfulness for all who worked so hard and cheerfully during my absence. The content of this Annual Report testifies to the way the parish thrived during this time. The three wardens: Tracy Lenfesty, Susan Harris and John Swaine cared for the parish in every possible way. Fathers Richard, Todd, and Strople were joined by Father Gordon Neish to offer godly and priestly ministry in Word, Sacrament and pastoral care. YouthNet prospered in its outreach to young people. The list of parishioners who went about their various and significant ministries in worship and mission, both in the parish and neighbourhood, would be exceedingly long.

I would also like to take this opportunity of saying "Thanks" to Debby for the heartwarming meditations which she presented at these celebrations of Holy Communion.

During the year I also gave Private Communion to three families of our parish. These are monthly visits which take place throughout the year. These private Communions also gave me the opportunity of visiting the homes of these parishioners.

Report of the Music Director

THE CHOIR OF THE PARISH OF SAINT GEORGE continues to offer grace-filled contributions to the liturgies at Saint George's, typically on Sundays at the 10:30 a.m Choral Communion services, as well as at the 9:00 p.m. offices of Choral Compline. The full choir rehearses on Thursday evenings normally for two hours -- as well as on Sunday mornings, so singers undertake an enormous responsibility in their time and spiritual commitment when they agree to be part of the choir. In addition to the regular services the choir often sings at other events, including the Advent Service of Lessons and Carols and the Christmas Service of Lessons and Carols, services of Choral Communion for feast days, weddings, memorial services, and monthly offerings of Choral Evensong. Also, In Lent, a series of musical and artistic meditations was offered by our Parish musicians and some guests. In addition to the regular round of communion service settings and motets the choir prepared and performed liturgically, Benjamin Britten's cantata, Rejoice in the Lamb, and Requiem by Maurice Duruflé. The choir also participated in a feature concert of the Scotia Festival of Music held at the Round Church in June, and, in December, sang at an Advent event at the Atlantic School of Theology, which was broadcast on ATV though the holiday season. EACH MEMBER OF THE CHOIR deserves your thanks for the work of preparing -so diligently and prayerfully -- for the worship experiences that the Saint George's family is so fortunate to have. While all of the musicians here share equally in the offerings of our music, I am especially grateful to Brian Start for his able assistance in organ leadership,

as well as to Paula Philips and Peter Duinker for their choral assistance, when I am away from the Parish.

WE WERE PARTICULARLY PLEASED to welcome Emily Harnish and Kelsey Hunter into the choir this Fall. Furthermore we were delighted to assist Sebastien Labrie and Nicholas Veltmeyer in their journeys toward the Tenor or Bass sections (They began as Altos in the September!) These young musicians are learning the complex array of repertoire that is sung at St. George's, and it is a privilege to share that tradition with singers who will uphold it in the future. We have welcomed Ross Gower, Colin Webster, Andrea Lee, Benjamin Lee, Barry Stevens, Sarah Stevenson, Julia Nordmann and Natasha Harwood to the choir this year, and their presence continues to add to the overall sound the choir makes. New members are always welcome in the choir, and I am keen to listen to anyone interested in participating.

GIFTS OF MOTET SCORES and anthem collections have been made recently in thanks for the choir's singing at events such as weddings, funerals and memorial services. This is helping to build, and to replace damaged or missing copies in the fairly good library of choral music that the Parish houses. Gifts in thanksgiving or in memory of loved ones are always welcome!

OUR LÉTOURNEAU ORGAN was given its inaugural recital in February by internationally acclaimed organist Joan Lippincott. Excerpts from this concert were later broadcast nationally on CBC Radio Mrs. Lippincott was thrilled with TGEOR our instrument as have been many other

organists who have visited here during the year. However, one of the drawbacks in housing the organ in the chamber on the North side of the church is the effect that weather will have on the instrument. The combination of hot sunlight beaming in on it from the south windows, and often extremely cold (or moist in the summer) air drifting in through the frequently opening door below it will not be good in the long term. I am confident that we can intervene in these adverse conditions by dealing properly with the entrance system at the north door of the Round Church.

THE ROUND CHURCH WAS USED FOR CONCERTS and other arts events, including concerts sponsored by the Saint Cecelia Concert Series, Halifax Camerata, the Scotia Festival of Music and The Hymn Society of United States and Canada. The church was also used a recording venue by CBC Radio, and for a Christmas special that was broadcast both on Vision TV and PBS. Each of these various events generated revenue for the Parish. As we continue to provide this beautiful building for concerts and recordings, it will be important to maintain a high level of viability, accessibility, hospitality and comfort. A great asset to potential performers – as well as our own music program - would be a piano.

I am hopeful that the Parish can continue to consider ways to expand the ministry of music at St. George's. One enterprise this coming year will be the creation of a series of music and art events that will occur at 4 o'clock on Sundays.

Although some of these occasions will be liturgical in nature (monthly services of choral evensong, for example) others

may take the form of concerts or meditations that include sacred music, poetry, dramatic and dance presentations.

Many parishioners continue to relate to me the importance of the tradition of sacred music offerings here in relation to their spiritual lives. Continuity is vital in this regard, and I attempt to ensure that we can expect to worship through suitably offered music week by week throughout the year. Thus, I want to explore the possibility of creating a position of associate organist and conductor that would help ensure continuity in our musical and liturgical tradition during times that I am away from the Parish due to other commitments.

Finally, please know how appreciative I am of your comments regarding your experience of the music at Saint George's. The choice, preparation and liturgical performance of our music intends to reflect the spirit of the worship event in praise of God. As God is made known to humanity in many forms, so we may hope to glimpse a vision of God's glory through the music we offer, while ministering to ourselves and to others in and through that music. As we remain open to our neighbouring community, I hope we can continue to reflect on how our neighbours shape our musical offerings - as those offerings open our hearts to our central act as a community of faith. In thanks for your continued support, friendships, and concerns for the music at Saint George's Lam

The Wardens' Report

Another eventful year in the life of our parish has come and gone. We have much to look back upon with thanksgiving and much to look forward to with hopeful expectation. But I wonder if we truly realize how blessed we are to be part of this remarkable parish. For so many congregations today, the desperate need is felt to find out who they are, to find some sense of definition that will grip and hold people together as a parish. "Visioning" is the current buzzword, as congregations grapple with dwindling and aging numbers in their pews. If only they could catch a vision...

At St.George's, surely it is the case that everyone is fired by a vision for this parish. Our vision starts where it should - "Be thou my vision, O Lord of my Heart" – and pours forth in heartfelt worship as expressed in the Book of Common Prayer, enhanced by challenging preaching and beautiful music. It calls us to a life of service and love within our surrounding neighbourhood, as well as within our parish. It leads us always to know our sins and failures, always to know that whatever we accomplish is done only by God's grace. And this vision has brought together a wonderful and richly diverse group of people.

So what has this "wonderful and richly diverse group of people" been up to during this past year? What is the record of joys and sorrows that we should stop and consider? Read these reports and find out! The individual reports will speak for themselves.

But overall, the most notable feature of the past year was undoubtedly the six month absence of our Rector, while he was stationed as a military chaplain with United Nations Peacekeepers on the Golan Heights. Although we as wardens approached this period with considerable trepidation, we honoured our Rector for his commitment to minister to these young men and women serving so far from home. The continued well-being of the parish was assured by the care with which Fr. Thorne prepared for his absence and through the wonders of email he was in frequent contact with us while he was away. But most important of all, he left us in such good faithful pastoral hands. Fr. Gordon Neish, our Priest-in-Charge during this period could not have been a better fit for St.George's. We are deeply thankful to Fr. Neish for his care of our parish while Fr. Thorne was away.

As the year drew on, the condition of the church hall began to be a dominant concern for the parish. A special parish meeting was called in June to begin the process of serious consideration of options for the future. Through the remainder of the year, the Property Committee worked to gather and present information to assist the parish in making this important decision. As we prepare for this Annual Meeting, we are all conscious of the important decisions to be made concerning whether to build a new hall or renovate the existing hall. We know that whichever option we choose, we will have to work together, just as we did in the restoration of the church, to make sure that we are able to continue the mission and outreach of our TOEO parish.

St.George's has truly prospered this past year. The congregation has grown, offerings have increased. But more important than this, we continue to follow that vision which drew us here in the first place. We thank Fr. Thorne for never allowing us to turn away from this vision and we thank the congregation for its tremendous level of participation and support.


The Property Report

Building Development Committee Report to the AGM, February 2004

- 1) The Property Committee was busy this year on a number of fronts including the ongoing maintenance of properties and planning around the future of the Parish properties. There were many parishioners who contributed particularly to the property planning activities and lest I forget one, I would just like to thank them all for their efforts and I hope that this effort will put us on the road to a stable property portfolio.
- 2) The Property Committee has been split this year into the Building Development Committee and the regular maintenance (which now folds into the general administration function). The former Property Committee now constitutes the Building Development Committee with the responsibility for planning of the future parish properties.
- 3) A far as ongoing maintenance, the main expenditure this year was the replacement of the heating systems in the Hall which was completed in the fall. In addition there have been some other significant expenditures; repair from Hurricane Juan damage (some of which has been or will be covered under insurance) and an extraordinary increase in the per litre cost of heating fuel.

- 4) The Rectory tenancy was stable this year with no major problems with the building. The building condition is stable (fair) and there are some deferred repairs still on the books.
- 5) We continue to maintain the Hall on as required basis only.
- 6) The Alexandra/Kidston Glass site development did not get started this year as anticipated. However the signage and removal of the Kidston Glass building would indicate that the development is imminent.
- 7) Efforts are continuing on overall property planning and development. The intent was to look at all of the options and develop a small number of options to present to parishioners. This phase is now complete and we are ready for decisions. To recap:
 - a) Planning meetings were held over the first eight months. In these meetings, numerous options were examined by a diverse group of parishioners. The criteria encompassed property, historic, preservation, sustainability, aesthetics, cost and community issues.
 - b) Support was provided to the group through professional help by Anita Jackson (landscape architecture), Anwyll Fogo Architects (site and building development) and Hanscomb

- Cost Consultants (cost estimate for renovation to the existing Hall).
- c) As directed in the 2003 AGM, findings were brought before the parish in meetings in the spring and in the early part of 2004.
- d) We are now at a point where the



two principal options of repair or replace the Hall can be considered by parishioners and this is brought forward as an agenda item for the 2004 AGM.

Reports of the Standing Committees Spiritual Development

I must begin this brief report by thanking Susan Harris who has been chair of the Spiritual Development Committee in all but name during the last third of this year. While I was pre-occupied with matters domestic, she faithfully guided the work of the committee, ensuring that its various responsibilities were met.

In part because of the absentee chair, the committee was mainly concerned with the tasks that belong to the ongoing spiritual life of the parish – keeping going the various ministries of the Sunday School, the Deaf Community, the Altar Guild, the Music Programme, the Servers and so on. This work is the very stuff that knits together the spiritual life of the parish and many are involved both in the planning and the realization of the multitude of aspects that make worship and spiritual reflection possible at St. George's. The reports of at least some of what belongs to this work are contained below in this annual report, but I also wish to highlight the planning for Lent and Advent this year. In Lent, Dr Wayne Hankey conducted a Lenten series entitled, "The Fear of the least some of the least

Lord", using Charles Williams' novel, "Descent into Hell", in conjunction with selected passages of Scripture. Also in Lent, Daniel Watson, one of our parishioners, led a series based on the Diocesan Lenten Programme, called "Taking Up the Cross". Then in Advent, the Rector led a series of three sessions: "Seeing Christ in the Torah", "Seeing Christ in the Old Testament", and "Seeing Christ in the Psalms".

I should also mention just a couple of items that escape the groups reporting herein. First, in June the Spiritual Development Committee produced on behalf of the Parish a "liturgical portrait" of the Parish. This was done at the request of the Doctrine and Worship Committee of the Diocese which was, in turn, responding to a request from the Faith, Worship and Ministry Committee of the national church. This "portrait" was a largely descriptive reporting on the liturgical practices at St. George's. The purpose behind the initial request was evidently that the national church is seeking to understand the full array of liturgical practices in the Anglican Church of Canada – but with an emphasis on ascertaining the use of innovative forms.

Also worth reporting is the motion put to parish council and passed there that the Orthodox Parish of Saint Vladimir be able to use space in the Parish Hall so long as this is mutually convenient. This congregation is currently engaged in preparing the space in the hall where they will begin to worship in a few weeks.

Beyond these items, I commend to you the reports contained below.

Pastoral Ministry YouthNet

It has been another full year for YouthNet, marked by farewells to wellloved staff and the welcoming of new, developing new programs, and being surprised by how quickly some of our young people have grown up.

In the Spring, Kate Freeman and Naomi Blackwood both graduated from Dalhousie and left YouthNet to pursue new directions. Both were integral to the development of YouthNet, in particular the Day Camps and Wilderness Program. Bidding them farewell included many weeks of preparation: training new staff and planning for summer programs. Never before had Day Camps or the Wilderness Program been run by anyone but Naomi or Kate! Many of you will remember our formal good-bye to Kate and Naomi after a Sunday worship service in June. Twenty neighbourhood children came into the church at the end of the service and two spoke to the congregation about the impact Kate and Naomi had made on their lives. Naomi is now studying in

Toronto and Kate is working full time at ARK Outreach.

Kate McKenna, King's student and community resident, came on board to co-ordinate the Summer Day Camps and successfully ran two Day Camps and a Music Camp with the support of LaShawn West (his second summer with us). Like last year, the daily presence of dedicated volunteers ensured that each child received close attention and care. One girl arrived just after 8am on the second day of camp saying she couldn't sleep – she was too excited about the rest of the week. Another young person arrived on the last day of camp with cards to specially thank each of the volunteers. Kate and LaShawn are to be commended for sustaining the level of care and programming that is now expected by parents and children. Both gave everything they had to make the programs a success and will attest to being absolutely exhausted by the end of August.

Jim Wilson, a long time community resident and former YouthNet volunteer, took on Wilderness Camp Co-ordination with the part-time assistance of Alan Hall. They introduced nine youth to the program and ran our first ever junior leadership trip to the Cape Breton highlands. Jim also facilitated a partnership with the Black Business Initiative through which twelve of our senior youth built kayaks. Many will remember that Jim damaged his foot at the end of July and was unable to supervise the final Wilderness trip, but he continued to plan and organize behind the scenes. We are glad that he has now fully recovered.

YouthNet has long desired to bring the energy, focus and care of the summer into school year programming. This fall we were finally ready thanks to the strong foundations built these past six years. By the end of 2003, we were running six after-school programs compared with only three a year ago. We now see children every day of the week but Sunday.

With the closure of the Cornwallis Street Baptist Lunch Program we expanded our own noon program (previously run in partnership with Cornwallis) to include lunch. We now have 29 children attending and rely on the generosity of many parishioners to provide soup, sandwiches and vegetables each day (heartfelt thanks to you to all). We began a Latin club in partnership with the Dalhousie Classics department that has become a favourite of 6 kids. And we made plans for a Community Music Program, a CAP Site and Teen Community Leadership group - all now in action. Through the fall, Kate McKenna continued to co-ordinate the after-school reading club; community members Rhonda Newcombe and LaShawn West joined our regular staff in September and continue to provide excellent leadership in our various other programs.

Neighbourhood teens also continued to provide leadership in YouthNet programs and in the new year will benefit from workshops and special training. The United Way honoured three of these teens in their 2003 poster campaign. Seeing their faces on buses, posters and billboards around town has been a constant reminder to us of their achievements and of YouthNet's growth. These young people were once children

in our programs. Now they are entering the greater world as ambassadors of their neighbourhood, leaders for their peers, with some of YouthNet in their hearts and with them in ours.

Thank you to everyone who has made this year possible and who continue to believe in the kids and the work we do. We could not accomplish any of this without the support of generous volunteers who give so much of their time in over 14 programs each year. Thank you also to our financial supporters including the parish, the Diocesan Growth for Ministry Fund, Edmonds Landscape and Construction Services, ExxonMobil Canada, Segelberg Trust, the Youth Employability Project and many individuals. Finally, thanks to everyone who prays for us, the kids and the neighbourhood.

Annual Report for 2nd Halifax Scouting

When the Group Committee held its first meeting on September 15th, 2003, it was forced to face the fact that youth registration in the Scouting program at St. George's was very low. As only one scout registered, it was decided not to offer a scouting program for 2003/4, but, as a few children and youths had registered for Beavers and Cubs, programs are being held for them this year.

This downward trend in membership is a continuation of what we have experienced in the previous scouting year of 2002/3 in which, however, we did carry out a program for Scouts as well as for Cubs and Beavers. The group Committee has tried to recruit youth through the neighbourhood schools and churches – thanks especially to Lowell Perry and Barbara Swanson for their efforts in this respect. In part our difficulty reflects a decline in numbers in Scouting generally, whether in this city, province or in this country. Perhaps also we are competing these days locally with more alternative programs for youth. Those who do attend our program enjoy it, and we have good reason to feel pride in the leadership of our sections.

We thank YouthNet for its support and for its payment of membership fees. We also thank our section leaders, Kim Lickers and Scott Connors for Beavers, and Sarah Manos, Peter MacDonald and Nancy Clarke.

The Beaver program in 2002 gave a place for some children from Armbrae Academy when the Academy ceased to offer a program. This year the membership of 2-3 has been entirely of neighbourhood children. The usual Beaver activities have taken place, and all "kits" are now "Eager Beavers." Although our Beavers were too young to attend Area Camp last year, 2nd Halifax took part, and presented an interesting program. This year we are offering Camp and Lodges and Lairs instead.

The Cub program has also proceeded as usual. We owe a great deal of thanks to the busy medical students who devote some of their scarce leisure hours to it.

Every time I have happened on the program on Tuesday nights, I have been impressed by the quality of the activities and by the enjoyment of the cubs. There are 4-6 Cubs.

Because of the low numbers of registered youth – yet we have not really had trouble getting leaders – the Group Committee has considered the possibility of closing down the Scouting Program entirely at St. George's at the present time, but we have not yet reached a decision on this issue. Stepping Stone

The association is a 'user friendly non-profit organisation that supports individuals involved in the sex-trade by contributing to their health, safety and well-being'. As well as helping those in and formerly in the sex-trade it tries to reach youth at risk of becoming involved.

Its guiding principles, briefly summarised, are: To establish and maintain contact with individuals, responding to immediate needs. To help them access existing services and to establish a self-help programme. To encourage the use of harm-reduction strategies. To provide long-term support to former sex-trade workers. To educate youth about the risks relating to prostitution.

Stepping Stone has been generously funded by the Department of Community Services and the United Way as well as by the Halifax Youth Foundation and private donations. There is some concern that due to cut-backs to the DCS, the next budget may be reduced. The annual staffing cost is \$115,220. The budget for 2003/4 of \$136,900 has allowed for many improvements to be implemented at 2224 Maitland St.during the past year. A table and chairs were purchased and all rooms repainted in time for the Summer Barbecue and Open-house. A computer for programme-users will, it is hoped, EUM

help them in finding alternative employment.

Some regular programmes are:

- Strolls, handing out condoms and offering counselling, court support,
- addiction counselling, visits by a nurse, Bingo, 'movie night' and cooking
- classes (focussed on good nutrition on a budget).

St. George's main interaction with our neighbours at Stepping Stone is at their Christmas Party. Once again this year Karen Wheeler organized the turkey-dinner, assisted by members of the congregation and YouthNet staff, who also provided crafts and games. This year David Buley contributed musical entertainment. Many thanks to all who helped to make this 'the best party yet!'

We have budgetted \$400 for the Christmas Party but thanks to generous donations Jeannine has been able to set aside enough to cover next year's party, freeing St. George's to use that money elsewhere.

Another link between Stepping Stone and St. George's is through Youthnet. Some of the mothers who use the dropin have children attending Youthnet programmes. It is hoped that this bond may be mutually beneficial, particularly in the area of reaching youth in danger of becoming enmeshed in the sex-trade and educating them about the risks.

This year ten people we confirmed from St George's at the regional confirmation service held at St Matthias'. Six young people and four adults received the Apostolic Rite. Stephen Harnish, Fr Thorne and I were responsible for the preparation of our youth candidates and David Olding and Fr Thorne prepared the adults. It was a blessing having so many from our parish confirmed and to see the presence of parishoners at the confirmation service supporting the confirmands. Please keep the recent confirmands in your prayers: Daniel, Kale, Ryan, Erica, Jonathan, Kelsey, Andre, Ben, Jesse and Kate.

Since the institution of regional confirmations three years ago it has been discouraging not having a Prayer Book confirmation service. Our candidates are formed within the Prayer Book tradition and the liturgy used at the regional services is largely unfamiliar to them. Thankfully, the Bishop explained during his recent visit that in situations where the number of candidates for confirmation at a regional service are by and large drawn from Prayer Book parishes it is only sensitive to use the Prayer Book liturgy. This is wonderfully encouraging news.

The Web Page

The last year has not seen many changes in the appearance of the website. The single major addition to the site was Fr Thorne's 'Letters Home' to the parish from his peacekeeping duties in the Golan Heights. Word got around, and several individuals who know Fr Thorne from outside the parish (and some former parishioners now living elsewhere) asked to be notified when new epistles appeared, resulting in more traffic on the website.

When the website project was initiated, it was hoped that new people might discover St. George's via the Internet. Recently Fr Thorne and I were thrilled to learn that at least one new parishioner has come to St George's because of what they read on the website.

In January 2004, our service provider, Eastlink, moved the website to a different server, doubling the amount of server space available to us. This was done at no additional cost to the parish. The parish had actually been paying for this service all along and the error was only detected when the website exceeded its memory limitation on the previous server. This move is good news on several fronts. Not only does it double our space, it will allow some technical changes which will make updating the site much easier. There are also a number of other potential changes which were not possible with our previous server and these possibilities will be further investigated in the coming months.

Synod Report

Diocesan Synod met at St Mary's University 29-31 May 2003

The bishop's charge was delivered on the afternoon of May 29th. The Charge was fairly lengthy and the full text of the Charge can be found on the Diocesan website (www.nspeidiocese.ca). Among the highlights - the Bishop's intention to consider amalgamating parishes in Team Ministry approaches such as is currently in place in Pictou County; the Bishop is once again receiving inquirers for the Non-Stipendary Ordained Ministry; the report of the Episcopal Ministry Task Force and the Bishop's intention to bring a motion to Synod which would result in the election of a Suffragan bishop by the end of the calendar year with a consecration of a suffragan early in 2004, a Capital Campaign for the diocese to fund a variety of programmes and our diocesan commitment to the residential schools settlement.

There were several presentations throughout the Synod on topics including:

- A presentation from Bill Close, President of AST on the upcoming changes to AST's mission, recruitment and training of students.
- Mission to Seafarers and the need for a chaplain to fill the position that has been vacant for almost a year.
- The Rev'd Canon Sue Moxley, rector of St Mark's Halifax spoke about Sanja who is living in sanctuary at St Mark's.
- Representatives of the Visioning Task Group spoke about the Visioning process in the diocese.

The Capital Campaign Task Group the final target number for the
GEOR Campaign has not been set.

- The Rev'd Dr Sue Moxley spoke to Synod about the New Agape agreement signed at the last General Synod. The goals of this agreement are: self-determination, justice, healing, historical reparation and partnerships. This presentation was followed by a presentation from a delegation visiting from the Diocese of Keewatin.

Perhaps the most interesting debate of Synod came out of a resolution regarded raffles in parish fundraising. This motion generated a great deal of discussion and was defeated in a vote by orders (clergy and lay delegates voting separately where the motion must carry in both orders).

Other candidates were the Reverend Ron Cutler, The Ven Eric MacDonald, The Reverend Diane Parker and The Reverend Robert Richmond. The Reverend Diane Parker and the Reverend Robert Richmond withdrew after the second ballot.

Finance

Counters report

Counters are the people who disappear each Sunday after church to count the weekly offering while the rest of the congregation gathers for fellowship in the church hall. Working in pairs as required by the canons of the diocese, they count and record contributions to ensure that all money received is accounted for and that every identifiable giver can be issued an annual receipt for income tax purposes.

In a dynamic parish like Saint George's, counting is taking an increasing amount of time. Last Easter, it took four people four hours each, a total of 16 working hours. As a result, we have developed a system to spread the load. There are six teams of two who each count for a month of Sundays twice a year. The other 10 months a year, they too can share in post-worship fellowship.

Parish Historian

This year saw the publication of Elizabeth Pacey's long-awaited book on St. George's, which appeared in the autumn under the title Miracle on Brunswick Street (Nimbus Press). We should all be grateful to Betty, for her work has exceeded our expectations, and fully deserved the glowing review I gave it in the Sunday Herald, 14 December, 2003, which is reprinted in the February issue of the Lance. I hope that all members of the parish who can afford it will purchase and read Betty's book, which is also splendidly illustrated. In an act of exceptional generosity, she has agreed to donate her royalties to the Church.

Despite the appearance of Miracle on Brunswick Street, parishioners will still find it useful to read the three lectures on the history of St. George's by Father Thorne, Brian Cuthbertson and myself, published in a booklet entitled Church and Community: Serving God and Neighbour; copies (\$5.00) are still available, the proceeds going to support Youthnet.

We have made significant progress in the process of establishing a records management policy. The purpose of such a policy is to establish which records need to be kept on the church premises, and for how long, and which are of sufficient importance to be kept for archival purposes. St. George's has no facilities for the preservation of such records, but Brian Cuthbertson, Diocesan Archivist, has agreed to accept records from us on a ongoing basis as soon as we have developed a policy. We must, accordingly, work out which records we think of sufficient importance to preserve. Sarah Stevenson and I have been working on this question. Through Sarah's initiative, we were fortunate in being able to get a comprehensive report done on the church records by two students in the School of Library and Information Services at Dalhousie, Kat Loker and Heather Berringer, which they sent us in April. As they undertook this study as their assignment for a graduate course, there was no cost involved. The students produced a very thorough document which will provide Sarah and me with a basis to continue working on a records management policy which will eventually be brought to Parish Council. Meanwhile, we have made one big step in transferring records. Anne West's collection of restoration material is now deposited in the Diocesan Archives. We owe Anne a debt of gratitude for assembling such a well-organized and catalogued collection which documents a defining moment in our history, and will be of great interest to future generations.
