Prelude

Celebrant: This is the night when Christ the Lamb of God gave himself into the hands of those who would slay him. This is the night of Christ's agony in the Garden of Gethsemane. Our Lord calls us His Friends and then is betrayed by the kiss of friendship and denied by one of his closest disciples. This is also the night when Christ took a towel and washed the disciples' feet, giving us an example that we should do to others as he has done to us. Let us also remember that on this night Christ our God gave us the holy feast of the Holy Communion, so that we who eat the bread and drink the cup may proclaim his death and passion for our redemption, be partakers of his resurrection, and at the last day may reign with him in heaven.

The Lesson: John 13: 1–15

It is customary at this time to offer the Pedilavium (The Foot Washing). Due to COVID-19 restrictions, we are unable to do so this year. Nonetheless, the choir will sing Ubi Caritas which has been part of the Christian Liturgy on Maundy Thursday for nearly one thousand years. During the singing of these ancient words let us recall our Lord's humility and his example of love which we should follow.

After the final hymn, the congregation watches as the Lord's Table is stripped and the church made bare of its ornaments. We remember the betrayal of our Lord. The following antiphon is said: "They part my garments among them and cast lots upon my vesture." The congregation reflects on Psalm 22 (BCP page 354) – which will be sung by the choir – without the Gloria Patri. When the stripping is complete, the antiphon is repeated. After a few moments the account of the Agony in the Garden is read (Matthew 26:30 - 46). We hear of the struggle of the human and Divine wills in Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane.

Finally, a sharp noise symbolizes the betrayal of the Son of God.

Could ye not watch with me one hour?

In response to our Lord's invitation to his disciples, you are welcome to stay in church to pray after the end of the service. You may wish to pray at the altar of repose (at the back of the church) where bread consecrated at the service this evening is reserved to assist our contemplation of Christ's loving presence and of His agony in the Garden of Gethsemene. We will keep this vigil in-person in the Round Church until 12 midnight, after which you are invited to keep vigil at home until 7 a.m. when there will be Morning Prayer & Litany for Good Friday, followed by Holy Communion (Mass of the Pre-Sanctified). A sign-up sheet for the vigil with 30-minute time slots is posted at the back of the church. If you are able to be physically present, please add your name to the list so we can be sure that someone is present in the church at all times until midnight. We need two people for each of the times, so that no one will be keeping watch alone. If you are able to keep watch from home between 12 midnight and 7 a.m. either sign up on the posted list if you are near enough to do so or otherwise, email Susan Harris at susan.susanharris@gmail.com

We pray, by God's special grace and favour, that we might know the joy of watching and praying with our Lord Jesus Christ. Our sacrifice can be nothing more (nor less) than an offering of thanksgiving for the redeeming Love he has shown for us in his passion and death. When you leave, please go out in silence.
