Worship during the Pandemic

The ongoing COVID-19 pandemic means that we must take extra precautions to help prevent the further spread of the virus. While in the church, please...

- wear a mask;
- clean your hands upon arriving;
- check in with the greeter to record your name;
- do not sit in the pews marked off with a ribbon;
- refrain from shaking hands and try to cough or sneeze into your elbow.

At the time of the Holy Communion (during the 10:30 a.m. service only), please remain seated until the greeter has signaled that it is time for you to go. Those sitting around the outside aisles and the upstairs Gallery will go first, followed by those sitting around the centre aisle.

There are two stations for receiving the Sacrament, one on each side of the Communion rail. We ask that only one person or household go to each station at a time.

Upon leaving the Communion rail, please turn to the left and go through the vestry door or follow the arrows back down the central aisle of the chancel. (The latter may be easier for those with mobility problems).

At the end of the service, please exit by any of the doors (the vestry door to your left, the parking lot door on the right, or the Brunswick Street doors). Please leave your prayer books and hymnals in the crates provided.

At all times, we must observe physical distancing in the church, keeping six feet or two metres from those outside of your family or household.

If you have travelled or have been in direct contact with someone who has travelled outside of the Atlantic 'bubble' within the last fourteen days or are feeling unwell and have symptoms of COVID-19, please do not come to church. Let the Rector know if you are unwell so we can offer our care and our prayers for you.

Consecration of New Diocesan Bishop

On Saturday, September 18th, The Rev'd Sandra Fyfe, presently Rector of St John's, Horton in Wolfville, Nova Scotia, was elected bishop of our Diocese. She will be consecrated and installed on the Feast of Saint Andrew (Monday, November 30th) at All Saints' Cathedral. Due to current gathering restrictions, only those specifically invited to the Cathedral will be able to attend the service in person. A number of gatherings are being organized throughout the Diocese at which people will be able to watch the service live. It will also be live-streamed online through YouTube and Facebook. More information will be published as it comes available.

Christmas Outreach for Families

Every year Saint George's tries to help families in our neighbourhood by providing them with Christmas gifts, gift cards, and everything they need to cook a Christmas dinner, including a turkey. You can help by providing financial support, donating a turkey, groceries, new (with tags) children's clothing, new toys, or diapers. The cost to sponsor an entire family is usually about \$250, depending upon the number of children. You can place donations in the offering plate clearly marked "Christmas Outreach" or make an etransfer to treasurer@roundchurch.ca. Last year we provided support to 15 families. The need is especially great this year. Typically, volunteers would gather on a Saturday morning in late December to help wrap and deliver gifts. Obviously, this may not be possible due to the ongoing pandemic, but we will keep you posted.

Update from the Finance Warden

Our financial year (January to December) is drawing to a close.

In October the Parish continued to carry a surplus of about \$40 000.

Undesignated offerings increased slightly from September. Rental income is approximately 25% under budget due to COVID restrictions in the spring, and total expenses have climbed up to 74% of our annual budget. We continue to receive wage subsidies for the Rector, Music Director and Parish Administrator, but at a reduced rate (down from a peak of 62% to a low of 7%). This rate is adjusted monthly. Despite COVID we have done well. The wage subsidies have given us the freedom to spend some funds on necessary repairs to the Round Church. We hope to recover some of that money through extra donations - please see the announcement in this bulletin.

We hope to be able to carry a surplus into 2021, a year which will surely be as challenging a year as 2020. If we maintain or increase offerings in the next seven weeks we will achieve that goal. The parish functions best when offerings are regular and stable. Stability is especially difficult to achieve during a pandemic. We can do our part to create stability by making our offering to the church regularly - monthly or weekly.

Many thanks to all who have contributed to the life of our parish so far this year.

Repairing the Round Church

In September we told you that the Parish undertook three major maintenance projects in the Round Church this summer all of which are now complete. The first was the installation of a new natural gas furnace. We give thanks for a generous donor who provided the resources for us to undertake this project in such a timely fashion. The second project was the painting of the upper exterior portion of the drum and the cupola. This work was completed in September. The third project was the re-shingling of the church roof. The shingles were close to their end-of-life and needed to be replaced before winter. This work was completed in October.

Appeal for Funds for Repairs

The total cost of the painting and reshingling was approximately \$80,000. We received a grant of \$10,000 from the Province of Nova Scotia and a grant of \$25,000 from the Municipality towards these two projects. Parish Council approved the transfer of \$20,000 from our short-term Preservation Fund to help fund these projects. These monies are funds which have accumulated from the interest on Preservation Endowment and can only be spent on the maintenance of the Round Church. This means that we need to raise \$25,000 by the end of this year to pay for these projects.

To date, we have raised approximately \$12,000, so we are about half-way there. We are writing to ask for further donations so we can meet our target by the end of December. You can do this by placing an offering on the collection plate or via e-transfer to treasurer@roundchurch.ca. Please mark your donation "Repairs to the Round Church".

Let us give thanks that we have been blessed as a congregation with the resources to maintain this national historic site in love for God and for this neighbourhood.

The Sunday Next Before Advent

excerpt from COMMON PRAYER: A Commentary on the Prayer Book Lectionary

"The Lord our Righteousness", prophesied by Jeremiah (B.C.P., p.259), sums up the season of Trinity and turns us toward Advent. The gospel of the Sunday Next Before Advent concludes with the finding of the Righteous One: "We have found him of whom Moses in the law, and the prophets did write, Jesus of Nazareth." This righteousness is what we have sought in Trinity season through the practice of Christian virtue. By following daily the teaching and example of Jesus and by the nourishing grace of the Holy Spirit, we have endeavoured to grow up in the Righteous Branch, and so to "plenteously bring forth the fruit of good works."

"Christ our righteousness" brings us to the cost of the goodness we have from God and so points us toward Advent. To make us righteous Jesus had to bear our unrighteousness and accept the judgement on our sins. The Christ must die; he is "the Lamb of God". So John the Baptist, the Advent prophet, proclaims. The sacrifice of Jesus is the beginning of all the goodness we have, just as his perfect life is the example of the ideal we seek. He comes to be our judge because he has first come in great humility to be our Saviour. Advent begins in the longing for righteousness, and so we start by praying God to stir up our wills. Advent goes on to the humiliation of Christ coming to die for our sins, and proceeds to that judgement in which all unrighteousness is consumed and those who are in Christ arrive home to dwell with God.

The Office readings for the week of the Sunday Next Before Advent confront us with the righteousness we seek in the "Sermon on the Mount" from the Gospel according to Matthew. Yet God does not send Jesus to condemn the world by the standard of an impossible perfection, but rather to save it by raising us into the very righteousness of God present in his Son. We read the Book of Wisdom as a First Lesson because it concerns the Word of God which in creation and providence runs mightily from one end of the earth to the other and orders all things well (Wisdom 8.1).

The Book of Revelation presents fearsome judgement in order to bring us to the Lamb who begins and ends not only this Book but all things. Revelation begins with "Alpha and Omega, who is and who was and who is to come" (1.8) and ends with the word of Jesus that

I am Alpha and Omega, the first and the last, the beginning and the end. (22.13)
